A note about this evening

From Jesus' entry into Jerusalem to his crucifixion and resurrection, Christians through the ages have found that a devotional focus on these last days in the life of Jesus can have a life-changing effect on us in the present. By following in his steps, listening intently to his final words to his dearest friends and to his words from the cross, even re-enacting some of the most affecting and penetrating moments of these last days, we find ourselves feeling as if our devotional sharing in his passion leads to a deeper sharing in his resurrection.

A poignant feature of the Maundy Thursday liturgy is the stripping of the altar, followed by the ritual washing and anointing of the altar. When the sanctuary (the area around the altar) is stripped bare, and the altar stands completely unadorned, we recall the desolation and abandonment Jesus knew at the time of his arrest, trial, and crucifixion. The altar is then washed, as a body would be washed, and the five crosses in the top of the altar, which symbolize the five wounds of Christ from his crucifixion (hands, feet, and side), are anointed with oil.

Finally, the reserved sacrament of consecrated bread and wine, which recalls Christ's presence, is processed to the Chapel of the Holy Spirit (an altar of repose), which represents the Garden of Gethsemane. It was here that Jesus went when he was deeply troubled and asked his closest friends to wait, watch and pray. When Jesus found them sleeping, he asked, "Could you not stay awake for one hour?" An all-night vigil is kept in the chapel with the reserved sacrament, and parishioners come and go throughout the night, taking turns staying awake and praying for at least one hour.

We pray that what you experience in this time and place will awaken you more completely to the presence of God and to the life that God has prepared for you.

And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean." After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord – and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them."





And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,


Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Celebrant The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

At the Communion of the People

In preparation for burial, a body is often washed and anointed. Later in the service we will wash the altar, a symbol of Christ's body. We will anoint the altar, recalling how a woman anointed Jesus with fragrant oil before his burial. "The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume," the gospel says. After you receive Communion tonight, as we all draw nearer to the cross ourselves, you may wish to be anointed as well – a sign that we are all part of Christ's body, his hands and feet, his eyes, ears, and voice in the world today. During Communion, healing prayer ministers will be standing at five stations around the church to anoint your head and hands – and your feet if you like – with the same fragrant, healing oil. Those stations are at the front and back of the church, as well as at the baptismal font.

All are welcome to receive the Sacrament. When you are given the consecrated bread, you may consume it and then drink the wine from the first or larger chalice. If you wish, you may "intinct" or touch the tip of your bread to the wine. For this, a smaller cup will be available just beyond the chalice. You may also choose to receive Communion in only one kind. If you would like a gluten-free wafer, please tell the minister. Additional notes on receiving Communion are found in the pew racks.


