





"This is my life-blood poured out for you. Do this to remember me."


Celebrant Therefore according to his command, O Father,





On the first Sunday in July, two offerings—both of which have been sorely missed—will return. Immediately after the conclusion of the Celtic service, the **Sunday Community Supper** will be held on the lawn outside the church (weather permitting). This donation-based supper is a wonderful opportunity to catch up with old friends and meet people you may not already know. All are welcome, regardless of whether you are a member of St. Stephen's, or whether you've attended the Celtic service.

After more than a year's absence, in-person weekday Morning Prayer has resumed! Once again you may join the officiant for this brief service in the Chapel of the Holy Spirit. It begins at 8:10 a.m. and lasts about 30 minutes. As with all our indoor services at this time, mask-wearing is required for now.
